

"Dump" of Street People
& Rajneeshes
1984

I. DUMPING

There is potential for three categories of dumping.

- A. Trickle. This is the dumping we are currently seeing averaging 15-30 street people per day, usually dumped at locations in Madras and Portland.
Different from reject/release
- B. Sustained. Possibility exists for increased dumping to occur on a sustained basis. It would probably result in 50-100 street people being dumped in areas such as The Dalles, Madras, Bend and Portland.
- C. Massive. Massive dumping could be categorized as 200 or more street people dumped in any community, combination of communities or at random without ticketed transportation out of the state. Massive dumping could happen in any one of three ways.
 - 1. Simultaneously in several communities.
 - 2. Massive in one single community.
 - 3. Dumping in no one specific community, just at random outside of the ranch.

II. Notification Process (See flow chart)

- A. Rancho Rajneesh notifies OSP of vehicle containing number of street people and destination.
 - 1. OSP determines number of people without tickets, number with tickets.
 - 2. OSP notifies:
 - a. effected city police;
 - b. effected sheriff;
 - c. effected agency, i.e., Salvation Army, Harvest Mission, etc.;
 - d. Emergency Services Division.
 - 3. OSP notifies Governor's office and other notification process goes into effect.

II. NOTIFICATION PROCESS (cont.)

- B. In the event that no notification is received from the ranch:
 - 1. OSP with extra patrols will monitor all highways and exits near and around Rancho Rajneesh.
 - 2. OSP will stop any suspicious vehicle carrying street people and determine destination.
- C. Agency receiving street people:
 - 1. Processes each individual to determine destination.
 - 2. Obtains signed statement.
 - 3. Makes arrangements for transportation out of the state.

III. ISSUES

- A. Shelter and feeding
 - 1. Trickle dumping
 - a. In most communities the Salvation Army or other similar agency is prepared to process individuals.
 - b. Housing should be contained in one central area.
 - c. Feeding can be accommodated through shelters and voluntary resources.
 - 2. Sustained dumping
 - a. Housing should be contained in a central area with state of Oregon facilities used for backup.
- NOTE: Immediate contact with Governor's office should be made. *GT first; Bob O. second*
- b. Feeding: Most communities are equipped to handle feeding through shelter or voluntary services. State of Oregon can be relied upon for backup support. Immediate notification should be made with Governor's office. *GT first; Bob O. second*

III. ISSUES (cont.)

3. Massive Dumping

- a. State of Oregon will make arrangements to centrally house and assist in the feeding.
- b. State of Oregon will assist immediately with all intermediary transportation through the Military, DOT, State Police.
- c. State of Oregon will immediately assist in obtaining all necessary commercial transportation.

IV. SECURITY

- A. Security issues will be handled and coordinated through OSP as a backup to local law enforcement agencies.
- B. Oregon State Police troopers will be on-site at the holding center to monitor activities.

V. STATE OF EMERGENCY

- A. Situations involving sustained dumping and massive dumping will be assessed by the State of Oregon to determine the need for declaration of emergency.
- B. It is possible that sustained dumping will require a declaration.
- C. Massive dumping more than likely will require a declaration.
