

Consider the relationship between students and their professors. Since classes at Pacific usually range from 15 to 25 students, professors know much more than your name and how you did on your


last paper. They know you, your interests and why you're taking their particular course.







Pacific offers excellent opportunities to explore disciplines outside your major. An elementary education





Internships

As part of our "hands-on" philosophy, Pacific offers internships that give students the opportunity to earn academic credit for full-time work experience. Students can take advantage of our proximity to many of Oregon's leading high-tech companies and other businesses or go out of the state as part of the internship program.

Studying and working abroad

A good way to learn about other cultures is to study abroad. Pacific offers semester or year-long programs in Europe, South America and the Far East. Apart from language study, these programs immerse students in the culture of the host country. Any qualified student, regardless of major, may participate, and most financial aid packages will apply.

If you'd like to try working abroad, Pacific can arrange that, too. In addition

to regular internships, the University offers overseas internships in a number of countries.

The international students at Pacific really add an intercultural dimension to the University. We have students from Denmark, Finland, Hong Kong, Japan, Kenya, Taiwan, Uganda, and a variety of other countries from around the world. A student may have a lab partner from Indonesia, a fraternity brother from Kenya, or a classmate from Finland. Students seem to enjoy making friends from other countries and learning about other cultures. You really learn about your own culture when you learn how others see it.

A variety of other Pacific programs expose you to new ideas and other ways of thinking. Joint research with Pacific's faculty involves students at all levels. Past projects have included long-lasting batteries for space ships, nematodes for crop and insect control, and a study of the Holocaust.

Pacific's unique interdisciplinary Peace and Conflict Studies program explores the causes and resolution of conflict, drawing on faculty from all departments.

The University's annual debate series, run by students, lets you hear the opinions of such notables as William F. Buckley, Robert Bork, Jeane Kirkpatrick, Andrew Young, Patricia Schroeder and Arthur Schlesinger on everything from national defense to environmental protection. The acclaimed Portland Arts and Lectures series, co-sponsored by Pacific University, brings such literary stars as John Updike, Annie Dillard, Norman Mailer and Susan Sontag to the community.

Pacific Honors Program

Interested in an opportunity for special interdisciplinary study?

Academically talented students can apply to participate in the Pacific Honors Program. The program includes seminars and individual research with a member of the faculty.







The Great Outdoors

If you like the great outdoors, you've come to the right place. Pacific University is surrounded by it. The Oregon coast is just 45 minutes from the campus. Mt. Hood and some of the best skiing in the Northwest, downhill (year-round) and cross-country, is just a 90minute drive.

The Columbia River Gorge, a few miles east of Portland, offers hiking trails and spectacular waterfalls, and is famous for its world-class windsurfing. Hagg Lake, three miles from campus, is a favorite springtime destination for Pacific students and a cycling center for the area.

A Few Details...

Prospective students should know what the Admission Office looks for when considering an application. Every part of the process is important. Transcripts and standardized test scores are an indication of a student's ability to undertake a challenging academic curriculum.

The essay provides an opportunity for personal expression and expanding upon the talents, experiences and extenuating circumstances that make you unique. The recommendation is a reaffirmation of a student's potential and an interview allows applicants to make sure that all their questions have been asked and answered.


Beyond test scores and grade point averages, Pacific looks for extracurricular involvement. Accelerated and honors courses are taken into consideration. Positions of leadership and responsibility are important. Above all, Pacific looks for students who will not only participate, but who will be successful at the University.

Freshmen

Application requirements for entering freshmen include: a completed application form and application fee; an official transcript of high school course work; SAT or ACT scores; and a counselor recommendation. An interview with a representative of the Admission office is strongly advised.

Transfers

Application requirements include: a completed application form and application fee; transcripts from all post-secondary institutions attended (applicants with less than 30 college credit hours must also submit a high school transcript with SAT or ACT scores); and a counselor recommendation. An interview with a representative of the Admission office is strongly advised.



The Office of Admission will begin reviewing completed applications. November 1. Interested students are encouraged to apply early. Priority will be given to applications received by March 15. Late applications will be considered on a space-available basis.

Financial Aid

Pacific University has an aggressive financial assistance and scholarship program. Academic scholarships and grants can equal three quarters of the cost of tuition per year. Talent awards in music, speech/debate, and athletics, together with Challenge Awards, based on financial need, supplement other types of assistance to make a Pacific education affordable to almost any student.

In 1992–93, 90 percent of our students received more than \$8.5 million in grants, loans, scholarships and work/study programs — amounting to an average of \$9,500 per student.

All students, regardless of need, should submit an application for financial aid between January 1 and February 15. Applications may be obtained from the Financial Aid Office at Pacific or from your current school, Transfer students must send Pacific a financial aid transcript from each college or university attended,



Tuition Contract

To better help students and their families plan for future tuition adjustments, Pacific University has instituted a progressive tuition program that will freeze a student's entering tuition rate and only increase that dollar amount by the annual rate of inflation (commonly known as the Consumer Price Index).

What this means for students entering in 1993 is that the University will contract with each student to hold their tuition rate constant at 1993 dollars with only CPI adjustments for subsequent years.


Is Pacific University Right For You?


