



ELLIS ISLAND

For over 100 years, Ellis Island stood as the symbol of a new beginning for millions of immigrants to America. During its peak years, 1892 to 1924, Ellis Island received thousands of immigrants each day, as many as 12,000 on the single busiest day in 1907. For these people, so much was left behind in exchange for a new life in America friends and family, customs and traditions, the known and the familiar. They worked, struggled, and achieved.

In 1954 Ellis Island closed its doors as an active immigration station and was opened to the public in 1976 for limited seasonal visitation. A "Restore Ellis Island Committee" was formed in the mid-70's, and in 1984, Ellis Island closed its doors for massive restoration. Under the supervision of the U.S. National Park Service, the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation raised the necessary funding totally from private donations, and the architectural firm of Beyer Blinder Belle performed the restoration itself. A once forgotten landmark, the Museum and Island reopened on September 10, 1990, remarkably transformed. Today it is a stunning monument commemorating American immigration heritage. All Americans now have the opportunity to see the place where so many of their parents and grandparents first set foot in this country.

Tonight we welcome Ellis Island Medalists and their guests to Ellis Island. The majesty of the restored buildings, the American Immigrant Wall of Honor, and the Immigration Museum offer us an inspirational setting for our memorable celebration.

CRITERIA FOR MEDALISTS

THE ELLIS ISLAND MEDALS OF HONOR are awarded annually to a group of distinguished American citizens. Each must satisfy one or more of the following criteria:

EXEMPLIFIES a life dedicated to community service.

PRESERVES and celebrates the history, traditions, and values of his/her ancestry group(s).

DEDICATES himself/herself to support and defend the values of American life.

BUILDS bridges between ethnic, racial, and religious groups in the U.S. and/or abroad.

SHARES his or her personal and professional gifts for the benefit of humanity.

It is not necessary for the nominee (or the nominee's ancestors) to have come through Ellis Island to be considered for this award.

NECO

Established in 1986 by NECO, the Ellis Island Medals of Honor pay tribute to the ancestry groups that comprise America's unique cultural mosaic. Held each May on Ellis Island, the event is full of pageantry, grandeur and emotion. All branches of the United States Armed Forces traditionally participate in this spectacular event. Dancers in their native costume add to the international flavor of the celebration. A gala dinner in the historic Great Hall on Ellis Island follows the moving ceremony. As a grand finale, a majestic fireworks display illuminates the sky and America's symbol of freedom, the Statue of Liberty.

Ellis Island is the gateway through which more than 12 million immigrants passed in their quest for freedom of speech, religion and economic opportunity. Through struggle and sacrifice, these immigrants have built our nation. The Ellis Island Medals of Honor celebrate the richness and diversity of American life, honoring not only individuals, but the pluralism and democracy that have enabled our ancestry groups to maintain their identities while becoming integral parts of the American way of life. Both the United States House of Representatives and Senate have officially recognized the Ellis Island Medals of Honor. Each year's recipients are read into the Congressional Record. Past Medalists include six U.S. Presidents, as well as Nobel Prize winners and leaders of industry, education, the arts, sports and government.

The creation of The National Ethnic Coalition of Organizations (NECO) was based on the conviction of its founders that the diversity of the American people is what makes this nation great. Its mission is to honor and preserve this diversity and to foster tolerance, respect and understanding among religious and ethnic groups.





The National Italian American Sports Hall of Fame SHF) is a spectacular 44,000 square foot facilithe heart of Chicago's Little Italy. NIASHF is celebrated for its focus on values and sportsmanship, its world-class memorabilia collection, and its charitable programs, which have provided \$6-million in scholarships to underserved children and generous support for physically-challenged athletes. Funds are distributed without regard to race, creed, or gender. With NECO's help, the NIASHF is launching an education outreach program titled A Level Playing Field, which teaches children the importance of diversity in sports.

NECO and Gift of Life International are healing hearts all over the world.

Since its inception in 1975, *Gift of Life* has surgically treated almost 10,000 children with life-threatening cardiac disorders from scores of countries, including Afghanistan, Bolivia, Cambodia, Dominican Republic, Egypt, Haiti, India, Iraq, Jordan, Nigeria, Peru, Sri Lanka, Uganda; Ukraine, Zimbabwe, and

more. Ellis Island Medal of Honor recipient Aido G. Frustaci, Esq., is former Chairman of this remarkable organization. NECO is committed both to underwriting medical costs and to providing transportation to several children who are scheduled for surgery in the near future.

NECO and The Ellis Island Immigration Museum (sponsored by The Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation, Inc.) are sharing the important stories of our nation's immigrant history, both in the past and today.

The Ellis Island Immigration Museum's brand new Peopling of America Center will expand upon the Ellis Island years of immigration to include the entire panorama of the American experience right up to the present day. There will be a special focus on the stories of the New Americans whose numbers are growing exponentially—enriching this nation's character—just as immigration during the Ellis Island era did 100 years ago. 
