In my sophomore year, Washburne Hall was our pride and joy. This was the only building on campus of which one could take a picture to convince friends and relatives that there really was a Pacific University—and a modern one at that! However, later that year excitement ran high as the ground was broken not only for an addition to Jefferson Hall, but also a new dormitory later to become Clarke Hall, a very successful experiment in coeducational facilities. As a Seni-

or, I had the privilege of helping dedicate a spanking new library which has proven to be a great improvement over the cramped Carnegie Building where many of you also remember cramming for spring finals after having spent too much time on the tennis courts or in the shade of a big oak.

Those of you who left Pacific before any of these new buildings were part of the campus can probably scarcely imagine the changes in campus life which have accompanied the new facilities. With all these "luxuries" one might suppose today's student would have nothing to which to look forward. But we do! The new facilities have instilled enthusiasm rather than apathy. Optometry students could hardly ask for a more modern lecture, laboratory, and clinic setup than they now have in Jefferson. Yet O. E. Phi, one of the student Optometric fraternities, has re-

cently completed a number of improvement projects including a new stereo music and P. A. system for the clinic, better planned lounging areas, and new study desks and tables. More projects are in progress by both Optometric fraternities for additional improvements including lighting and paneling.

Pacific now has one of the best small college intramural programs of all the surrounding schools. As a larger percentage of students have become involved in campus sports competition, the morale of the entire student body has improved. It is not surprising that a student senate move last spring to sponsor a student body contribution to the new building campaign, including a new gymnasium, met with great success in an all-campus vote. The students elected to increase their own student body fees by \$5.00 per semester for the next three years, in order to sponsor a \$33,000 student body contribution to the building program which also includes new science

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facilities in the recently-purchased Lincoln Junior High School and renovation of Carnegie to house the Education and Speech Departments and the ALERT Center.

The new program developing the ALERT Center (Assistance to Learning through Educational Research) is already providing students with some of the most modern self-learning media available. I'll bet there were times when some of you wished you could watch or listen again to a lecture or lab experiment. This is now possible at Pacific as a result of some of the electronic equipment supplied through Project Alert.

For each alumnus, Pacific holds many good memories. Yet BOXER has served for almost seventy years as a solid tie between the greenest Freshman, the seasoned Senior, and the oldest alumnus. As the warm weather sets in, anticipation of his reappearance is high. Rumor has it that he will be thrown again this spring!

If BOXER could talk and would stay in one place long enough to do so, no doubt the stories he would tell about Pacific's growth would be amazing. Perhaps he would even show a little pride as he relayed the story of how the students finally saw fit to name something in his honor after all his years of steadfast loyalty. The newly constructed BOXER PAUSE, is a snack bar located in the basement of Washburne Hall, and provides a plush lounge-type atmosphere for student dancing, recreation, or just an occasional coke. Initiated and built by the 1967-68 Student Senate at a cost of \$7,500, the Boxer Pause is another prime example of the students' desire to make a good Pacific better!

So often I have heard as an alum visits the campus: "Ol' Pacific's just not what it used to be when I was here." Even as I look back on my four short years at Pacific, I have to agree that many changes have taken place—but most of them have been for the better. Why don't you come see for yourself?

Parents Weekend And Hawaiian Luau Set for April 19-20

Parents of Pacific students will be treated to another varied schedule of campus activities at the Annual Parents Weekend and Luau slated for April 19-20.

Activities will include the breakfasts for Moms and Dads and the traditional sorority breakfasts. An art exhibit and ceramic demonstration and displays are planned. All buildings, including the University Museum, located in Old College Hall, will be open for visitation.

Registration for the weekend will begin Saturday morning following breakfast functions by sorority and independent groups. All living quarters will hold open house during this time.

The President's Luncheon, for parents and faculty, will give parents an opportunity to visit with faculty members and become better acquainted with the University's academic and development programs.

Hawaiian Club Luau

To highlight the day's activi-

ties, the Hawaiian Club will sponsor what has become traditional on Parents Weekend, their annual Luau.

Many months of preparation go into the Luau, prior to Parents Weekend. The authentic Hawaiian food is prepared, for the most part, in the Commons by Hawaiian students. Food items unavailable locally are flown over from the islands.

The Hawaiian Pageant, a part of the Luau, consists of genuine Hawaiian songs and dances—entertainment designed to transform you into a gay "Aloha" mood.

Participants are encouraged to wear native dress for the occasion. An elaborate array of concession items and exotic fresh-cut flowers from the islands will be on sale.

All proceeds for the Luau are put into a scholarship fund for the benefit of Hawaiian students.

Pacific Swimmers Place

Two Pacific University swimmers earned places recently in the NAIA District 2 swimming championships held in Portland.

Doug Horner, (son of George Horner '44) a freshman from Forest Grove, and Dick Ripper, a junior from North Bend, placed in the water meet. Horner finished fifth in the 100-yard backstroke and sixth in the 200-yard backstroke.

Ripper claimed seventh in the 50-yard freestyle and eighth in the 100-yard freestyle.

"Pacific Accepts Construction Bids"

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY—Three construction contracts have been awarded by Pacific University, totaling \$1,906,706.

A contract for \$1,452,800 was awarded Lawson Construction Company of Portland for construction of a gymnasium-field house. Groundbreaking is scheduled for June 15, with completion a year later.

Barnard & Kenny, Inc., of Beaverton was awarded a contract of \$244,606 to renovate Carnegie Hall. The building, constructed in 1912 as a library, will serve three branches of the University, the Department of Speech, Division of Education, and Pacific's electronic

learning-assistance center, Project ALERT. Construction begins March 24, scheduled to last 180 days.

The University purchased the city's Lincoln Junior High School and accepted Lawson Construction Company's \$209,300 bid for conversion of the building into a facility for the University's science department and School of Music. A starting date has not been firmly determined on this project, but construction will last approximately 180 days.

All three projects are being funded by Pacific's \$2.5 million capital fund raising campaign, which is still in progress.
